


SLE Third Grade Zoo Visit


Read or Pie Challenge


Save the Date for the Annual KABC Golf Outing




foursome which includes 18 holes of golf, cart, tee prize package, on course drink tickets, hole contests presented by Performance Lexus, plus team and proximity prizes.
