Thousands of students from across the country gathered to compete and show-case their business skills last weekend in Boston, Massachusetts for the 2016 Business Professionals of America National Leadership Conference.

Thirteen of those students were from Kings High School. Our students competed in events such as Computer Modeling, Entrepreneurship, Computer Network Technolo-



gy, Advanced Accounting, Economic Research, Virtual Promotional Photography, PC Servicing and Troubleshooting, and Virtual Multimedia & Promotion.

We are proud to report that our students did VERY well representing the district at the conference. The Economics Research Team of Logan Gray, Brendan Guerin, and Alex Orr placed THIRD in the Nation. Corinne Brown placed 6th in the Nation in Virtual Promotional Photography. Gage Woods also placed 6th in the Nation in PC Servicing & Troubleshooting. The team of Morgan FitzGerald, Emily Hoyle, Abbey Ketterer, and Mackenzie Mettey place 8th in the Nation in Virtual Multimedia & Promotion. In Advanced Accounting, Ee Yeoh Wong place 14th in the Nation. A 16th place in the Nation was accomplished by Lauren Goslee in Computer Modeling. Trevor Bartlett placed 19th in the Nation in Computer Network Technology, and Madison DePaoli placed 30th in the Nation in Entrepreneurship.

In addition to competing in their various events, the students, along with teachers Kelly Shields, Cassandra Barnes, Reggie Holtrey, and Brittany Selhorst, toured the sights of Boston and were treated to a private concert by X Ambassadors at Fenway Park.

Business Professionals of America is the leading CTSO (Career and Technical Student Organization) for students pursuing careers in business management, office administration, information technology and other related career fields.

P&G Historian Visits KHS

On Monday, May 9, Shane Meeker, Associate Director Corporate Storyteller & Company Historian for Procter and Gamble, visited Kings High School to speak to Andrea Wheeler's Heroes: Beyond the Cape class and Pete Moore's Mythology II classes.

The KHS students have been studying the Hero's Journey, based on the "The Hero with a Thousand Faces," by Joseph Campbell. The book provides a basic framework for understanding the typical quest (or journey) that most heroes undertake. This journey or quest surfaces in literature, movies, television shows, mythology, and in

many other elements that define and reflect a specific society/culture.

Mr. Meeker discussed his experience with the Hero's Journey at Procter and Gamble. He talked to the students about how the art and science of story could be used as a problem solving tool in any industry. He told the students that they create their own story asking them, "What do you want your story to say about you?"

KHS Student's Work Selected for Governors Mansion


District 4th Grade Visits CIS

Just a Reminder....

Beginning next school year, there are new immunization requirements for schools in Ohio regarding the meningococcal vaccine. The state will require incoming 7th graders to have one dose of meningococcal vaccine in addition to the requirement of one dose of Tdap vaccine.

Students entering 12th grade will need to have a second dose of meningococcal vaccine. The second dose must be administered on or after the 16th birthday. If the first dose of meningococcal vaccine was administered after the 16th birthday, a second dose is not required.

Meningococcal vaccines help prevent against the bacteria that cause meningococcal disease.


